## CISF "Great Indian Coastal Cyclothon" Concludes at Kanyakumari

Kanyakumari The Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) proudly announced the successful completion of its Mega Event, "The Great Indian Coastal Cyclothon" 2025, an ambitious initiative themed "Surakshit Tat, Samriddh Bharat" (Secure Coast, Prosperous India), The grand concluding ceremony took place at Kanyakumari, where a large crowd of enthusiastic locals cheered the CISF cyclists near the iconic Vivekananda Rock Memorial and the statue of Tamil Saint and philosopher Thiruvalluvar. The Director General of CISF graced the event as the chief guest, marking the culmination of an extraordinary journey that aimed to fortify partnerships with coastal communities and reinforce India's maritime security framework.

The Cyclothon, flagged off virtually by the Union Minister of Home and Cooperation, Shri Amit Shah, on March 2025, from the Rajaditya Cholan CISF Regional Training Centre in Thakkolam, Ranipet District, Tamil Nadu, saw 125 dedicated CISF personnel, including 14 women, undertake a grueling journey spanning 6,553 kilometers. Over a span of 25 days, the cyclists traversed 11 coastal states and Union Territories, drawing immense public support. More than 1,200 participants joined the Cyclothon at different stages, underscoring the widespread enthusiasm and commitment toward the initiative.

These interactions fostered a robust and resilient coastal security network, ensuring better communication and cooperation in addressing security challenges. Beyond its security dimension, the event also served as a bridge connecting inland communities with the nation's rich coastal heritage. It showcased the vibrant coastal culture, diverse flora and fauna, and the deeprooted traditions that define India's coastal identity.

The event saw unprecedented public engagement, with an estimated 30 lakh people actively participating in rallies, awareness drives, and cultural programs organized along the Cyclothon's route. The event's reach extended far beyond physical participation, as its message resonated with an astonishing 2.5 crore individuals through various online platforms and social media engagements.

The Cyclothon also garnered sub-stantial support from eminent personalities across different fields, further solidifying its significance. Distinguished dignitaries such as Puducherry Lt Governor Kuniyil Kailashnathan, Puducherry Chief Minister N.
